A Message From The Pastor

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PASTOR

Pastor Ben Carlsen

"Ask not what your country can do for you, but ask what you can do for your country." I must confess that I am not old enough to have heard JFK utter those famous words in his

inaugural address in 1961, but it is a quote I grew up hearing time and time again. The words, of course, were a call to action, a call for people, all people, to get involved in politics, in programs, in endeavors geared toward building a better United States of America. A laudable goal; and if you read the whole speech you begin to realize that President Kennedy did not utter these words as a call to individual action – but a call to communal action; not as a rally for one side of the political aisle or the other – but a call to, in today's parlance, bi-partisanship.

But there is something deeper than politics or social programs or working together in spite of differences which these words contain.

"Ask not what your country can do for you, but ask what you can do for your country." There are many things one could say about the 35th President of the United States, but one thing I will say here and now is that by all accounts he was a man of faith – and in these words we hear an echo of the Biblical call to service that esnares all followers of Jesus Christ.

To note just two:

"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another. By this everyone will know that you are my disciples, if you have love for one another." John 13:34-35

"Do nothing from selfish ambition or conceit, but in humility regard others as better than yourselves. Let each of you look not to your own interests, but to the interests of others." Philippians 2:3-4

I sometimes wonder if we would be better served, alongside keeping the "what can we offer?" conversation going, by also declaring to those around us that, in Christ, the faith of all is built up when the community acts in love and service. In other words, to paraphrase JFK, "Ask not what your church/congregation can do for you, but ask what you can do for your Lord."

But like I noted, it is not an either/or proposition, it is a both/and – for the reason we serve our Lord is that he first served us; the reason we can take risks and sacrifice of ourselves for the other is that Christ first gave himself for us, and in so doing secured our future for all time. All that's left then is for us to love and serve as we have first been served and loved.

So, this week, this month, this year, your whole life long, "Ask not what your church can do for you, but ask what you can do for your Lord."

A MESSAGE FROM OUR PARISH NURSE

HOW TO HELP THOSE WHO ARE GRIEVING

Losing a loved one is one of the most painful events in our lives. When deaths occur in our church family, we care deeply, and yet it can be hard knowing what to say or how to help. We may worry we'll "upset" the person who is grieving or bring their emotions to the surface. But our own discomfort can, ironically, cause the grieving person to feel even more alone and sad.

The next two newsletter articles will contain some reminders, based on grief research, which can help members of a church family offer supportive comments and gestures that really help.

You might say, "I'm so sorry you're going through this," or "This is such a hard time for you	ı and I want you to
know I care and am praying for you." Say, "One thing I'll always remember about	is

Talk about the person who has died. Use his/her name. Sometimes we assume it's hard for the grieving person to talk about their loved one. But, in almost all cases, their biggest fear is that their loved one will be forgotten. Share a brief story about their loved one or mention how much the person meant to you.

Avoid saying things such as "It's for the best," or "He's in a better place," or "It's a blessing." Or "I know just how you feel," or "You'll get over it," or "It's God's will." These clichés aren't helpful and often hurt more than heal.


Respect each person's time line for grieving. Don't say, "It's time to move on," or act as if the person is taking to long to "get over it." In reality, we never "get over" the loss of a loved one. We learn to live a different life...and each person needs to grieve in his/her own way. Show patience, kindness, and a willingness to really listen.

As we offer compassion to those who are grieving, remember this quote of Henri Nouwen: *The friend who can be silent with us in a moment of despair or confusion; who can stay with us in an hour of grief and bereavement, who can tolerate not knowing, not healing...that is a friend that cares.*

FIRST LUTHERAN CHURCH GENERAL ENDOWMENT FUND NEWS

The Endowment Committee has been working with Thrivent Financial to grow our General Endowment Fund. The purpose of this fund is to advance the mission of First Lutheran Congregation by providing planned giving programs to its members.

The general purpose of our Endowment Funds reads as follows:

To provide vehicles and structures for those who have the ability and desire to benefit First Lutheran Church through charitable giving that is consistent with our mission to proclaim the Gospel to the whole world. The fund will seek to provide a perpetual source of income to benefit three current categories:

- A. General Fund: Support the ongoing ministry of First Lutheran Church
- B. Missions: Local, regional and world projects
- C. Capital Projects: Major renovations, capital repairs and building of new facilities

This Endowment Fund provides an opportunity for each of us to live what we believe through our generosity. It is an expression of our beliefs and values, and matches our giving interest and financial circumstances. Endowment Fund gifts qualify for a current income tax charitable deduction and for an estate tax deduction.

Gifts of cash, life insurance, and assets that can easily be converted into cash, such as publicly traded securities, are appropriate to donate to an endowment fund. Other assets, such as certain types of unencumbered real estate, closely held stock, livestock or crops, also may be appropriate gifts. These gifts can be easily facilitated both during our lifetime and even after death.





Youth Group Grades 8-12

About the Program:

Generation Change is an all-new suite of Bible studies designed to lead teens to a better understanding of God, themselves and their money—and how it all works together. In the three different teaching series, students are equipped with biblical principles to BE who God created them to be, DO more with their money, and GO out into the world ready to write their story. Lesson videos with Dave Ramsey and his daughter, Rachel Cruze, along with engaging hands-on activities, will bring new biblical and financial truths to this generation, making them a *generation of change*.

BE Who God Created

Be Yourself

Teens will learn that their identity isn't wrapped up in what the world says. Rachel covers contentment and the truth that money itself isn't evil. This lesson also emphasizes that it's not about how much money you have, but rather what you do with money that matters.

Be Realistic

Today's teens are drowning in advertising and hit with peer pressure all day every day. In this lesson, students learn how to fight these pressures—and win. The concepts of debt and net worth are also introduced, along with the question of whether or not it's okay to have nice things.

Be Aware

Teens face a lot of money myths: My parents will always take care of me. One day, I'll have as much money as my parents do now. Teens don't need to budget. Money isn't spiritual. I shouldn't give if I don't have money. This lesson debunks these myths and gives students a new mindset for their money.

DO More With Your Money

Do the Details

A budget is the key to winning with money—even for teens! This lesson teaches basic budgeting, including Dave's cash envelope system and debit card strategies. Plus, students will tackle the subject of wants versus needs.

Do the Math

Math isn't fun. This lesson is. Teens will learn how to prioritize saving over spending and how to save for big things like a car and college. They'll also learn how compound interest works, the basics of mutual funds, and why having an emergency fund is such a big deal.

Do Your Part

What made the Good Samaritan so good? It was his attitude about giving. In this lesson, Dave and Rachel explore the meaning of stewardship. Topics include giving both time and money, understanding the tithe, giving beyond the tithe through offerings, and how teens can make an impact on the world today!

GO Write Your Story

Go Debt Free

What makes debt so dangerous? This eye-opening lesson reveals the truth about debt, from credit cards to student loans, along with strategies for living a debt-free life. Students also learn how a credit score works and why it's no measure of winning with money.

Go to Work

In this lesson, teens start to figure out their purpose in life and how choose a college major that fits. They'll also learn how to set big goals, create a winning resume, and ace a job interview.

Go the Distance

This lesson shows teens how to follow God's plan through their college years—and after. Topics include how to pick classes, buy books, get scholarships and grants, and more. This lesson also explores the cost of life in the "real world," from insurance to investing. Life takes a plan. They'll get it here!

Gospel Seeds - July 2017 A Monthly Update from Western ND Synod Staff *Amazing Generosity!*

Savior, Reeder has supported a seminary student. Synod staff helped connect the congregation and the student; for four years, they formed a relationship. It is about prayer and financial support. For the past four years, this congregation has been walking with Kim Gifford. Each year Kim would get a financial gift from the congregation to help cover seminary expenses. During this time, Kim has visited the congregation to preach.

In mid-June, Kim was ordained to the Ministry of Word and Sacrament and will now serve the people of Hope Lutheran, Surrey. Members of Our Savior called and asked if they could drive up from Reeder and help serve the lunch following the ordination – what an incredible gift!

Their compassion and generosity did not stop there. They have also made a gift to both the Mission Endowment Fund and Ministry Endowment Fund in Kim's honor – I am humbled.

Within a couple of weeks, synod staff will provide Our Savior with the name of another seminary student and a new relationship will begin to be built. Nearly this entire time, Our Savior has been (and continues to be) without a called pastor of their own. Thanks for your faithfulness.

Important Conversations...

In mid-June, we had the pleasure of hosting Presiding Bishop Elizabeth Eaton in the Western North Dakota Synod. During a whirlwind tour, we held a number of round table conversations. This visit was in part a follow-up to the Dakota Access Pipeline Protests of last fall, but also a way to talk openly about rural life and rural ministry issues.

Thank you to Lord of Life Lutheran, Bismarck; Bethel Lutheran, New Town; Barb and Dustin Roise (members of Bethlehem Lutheran, Ross); and the White Earth/McGregor Lutheran Parish for taking time to gather people for conversation.

What we witnessed was honest, open conversation where people were respectful of divergent viewpoints. This was another step on our journey of finding ways to go deeper in conversation in hopes of building relationships.

Stay tuned – there will be many more ways and opportunities for these conversations to continue.
